Instructions and Recommendations

Printing:


I recommend printing these on cardstock.

Print the color versions for an already finished looking project. Or print the black and white cards to color in yourself.

Assembly:

Assembling 25 boxes is no quick work- so get yourself a hot chocolate, put on your favorite movie and gather your materials. You will need:

- All 25 box patterns in color OR B&W printed on cardstock
- Crayons/coloring pencils/markers if you wish to color them yourselves
- Scissors
- Glue dots (sometimes called adhesive dots)




- Treats (ideas listed on next page)
- Tissue paper (optional, to put inside the boxes)

Cut out around the outside of the box pattern, careful not to cut the tabs off. Crease all the solid lines (sides, top and bottom, and all the tabs). Using glue dots, fold and stick the trapezoids to form the sides and bottom to create a box. Do NOT glue down the lid though! The top needs to be able to open so you can fill the boxes with goodies, and your children can open them.











Displaying:

The 3-D Advent Calendar Boxes have 4 different pictures on the sides to give you lots of fun ways to count down the days until Christmas! The four types of pictures are:

- Block numbers
- Ornaments with stars instead of numbers
- Jesse Tree people/events
- Nativity

For the numbers, ornaments and Jesse Tree pictures, you can stack them or arrange them in many different ways to suit your space or wants. Line them all up along your mantel if it's long enough, or down the









middle of a dining room table. Stack them up in a pyramid like these pictures show. Or you could even have fun hiding them all throughout the house.

The Nativity shows one large picture when the blocks are arranged. Use this key and the pictures to help you set them up. It's a little like putting together a puzzle! There is still some variability in how you arrange the





Filling them:

There are plenty of fun ways to fill your Advent Calendar boxes! Consider putting a small candy inside, a small toy, a clue to a place where a larger toy or book has been hidden, or strips of paper with activities to do. I went ahead and made 25 different activities on rectangles (one of each page) that you can use to fill your boxes if you desire. They are a variety of fun ideas, and works of charity. You could even make it a mixture of all of the above, filling them sometimes with candy, sometimes with an activity to do together, and sometimes with a small toy. Use whichever activity slips you like best, and in whichever





